- Joe Leibazite (PDX Audubon)– For public comment, I'd like to say that as the WG delves more into the planning for phase 2 (community based input on designation recommendations) I think it is important first that the scientific inventory information is made available to the public in advance of requesting designation recommendations so folks can clearly see ecological hotspots / data gaps. Other social science data inputs/updates should also be part of the inventory. Ideally, there would be a number of events along the coast where the updated rocky shore inventory is presented.
- **Tara Brock** (PEW) concern over limiting the eligibility for submitting a community proposal to Oregon Community Member. This should be up to the OPAC review instead. Using "Oregon Community Member" is not clear. Working Group should think about this.
